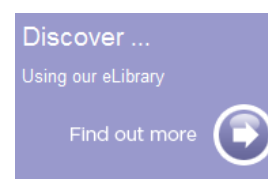


# Using Discovery Service to find articles

The Discovery Service searches across all the University's resources – books and journals – as well as indexing resources found elsewhere.

It provides you with an easy way to search for journal articles on a topic, or on a particular artist.

To access the Discovery Service, go to the main Library webpage at <http://www.glos.ac.uk/lis>, select the **Discover** link and log in with your usual University username and password.



Choose **Advanced Search** for the greatest searching flexibility.

Select the **Full Text** option from the left hand side to ensure you can access everything you find in full text through the University's subscriptions, and change the **date range** if necessary.

Choose **Peer Reviewed** if you want to restrict your search to the most academic journals.

Then click **Update**.

Your search results will be displayed in the middle of the screen as a list of articles, with short summaries to help you decide which to read.
